The Private Pilot License (PPL) ECAR 61:

The Private Pilot Syllabus has been specifically developed to meet the requirements of ECAR Part 61. The syllabus should be considered as an abstract or digest of the course of training. As such, it is important that instructors also refer to the pertinent sections of the regulations during the conduct of the course. This will ensure that all aeronautical knowledge areas, flight proficiency, and experience requirements have been included during flight training and are documented in appropriate records. The terminology for maneuvers and procedures listed in the syllabus is aligned with the "tasks" which are published in the ECAA's Private Pilot Practical Test Standards.

Aeronautical Knowledge:

General: A person who applies for a private pilot license must receive and log ground training from an authorized instructor or complete a home-study course on the aeronautical knowledge.

Syllabus:

Flight 60 hours of flight training including

- 1- 50 hours dual/ solo flight (Day local / Cross country /Night)
- 2- 10 Hours simulated / FTD.

Written Test

Student must pass a knowledge test with a score of 70 % or better. This test is administered at MFC facility. The test consists of 50 multiple-choice questions selected from the Private Pilot Test Bank, which will be given by ECAA designated examiner.

Flight Test

Student must successfully complete a practical test, which will be given as a final exam by ECAA designated examiner.

Requirements:

- 1- High School or what is equivalent as a minimum education.
- 2- Minimum age 17 years to be enrolled in for the course and 18 years to obtain a license.
- 3- Class II Medical certificate by an ECAA physician.
- 4- All students required by law to get Security clearance prior to commencing flight training in the A.R.E
 (Misr flying college will apply for student's security clearance when all student's documents with course application fee received.)
- 5- Personal interview with the MFC enrolment committee.

Duration:

Approximately 4 - 6 months
